Staff provided an update from the October board feedback on developing a program to support interested neighborhoods in developing a neighborhood association. Follow up included outreach to the recommended neighborhoods, learning from established neighborhood associations, clarified website language on neighborhood association benefits, and renter involvement research. Staff explained that different needs/levels of needed assistance were

expressed during the neighborhood outreach, as well as discussion of a potential partnership with SEGCC for neighborhoods needing assistance.

Staff sought feedback from the Board regarding recommendations or concerns for a potential pilot program. The program can help with outreach to residents, assist neighborhoods with identifying the organization's purpose, mission, structure, and roles. In addition, the program can provide example bylaws, assist with registering with the city, and create a partnership with SEGCC where appropriate.

The RFP was released on 10/23/20. The pre-bid meeting was held on 11/4/20. The questions were submitted on 11/6 and answers on 11/9. The RFP close was 11/16/20.

The City's review of proposals will be November 17-20, 2020, and the next Council workshop will be December 8, 2020. The date for the finalist virtual interviews or presentations will be December 14, 2020, and the earliest award by the City will be in January 2021.





WORKFORCE HOMEOWNER NEEDS

- Over 3,500 owner-occupied households in \$50-75K income range
 - Eligibility increase from 50% to 80% AMI (from \$48,800 to \$78,100 for family of four) serves more workforce homeowners as identified in 2018 Housing Study

ITEM SUMMARY:

The Georgetown Housing Authority (GHA) provides safe and decent affordable housing for over 300 families. Stonehaven buildings are between 39 and 54 years old with the first units built in 1967 (104 units), and subsequent units in 1973 (30 units) and 1982 (24 units).

Background

An action identified in the Housing Element of the 2030 Comprehensive Plan is to preserve existing housing and neighborhoods is to support and increase rental choices for low-income and workforce households unless the housing is substandard (Goal 6 Policy H.5) by evaluating the needs of the Georgetown Housing Authority's programs and identifying potential support the City can provide including, but not limited to, the use of CDBG funds, and energy efficiency upgrades (Action H.5.a.).

After meeting with GHA, several needs the City can potentially assist with were identified at the Stonehaven property. The needs are outlined below:

- 1. Exterior Repairs
- 2. HVAC upgrade
- 3. Water heaters
- 4. Electrical
- 5. Trash collection

The board will review a preliminary needs assessment and potential assistance.



ITEM SUMMARY:

At this meeting, staff will provide a short overview of Williamson County's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program and recommended projects for application for the FY21 program year.

Staff is proposing the following projects for consideration:

- 1) Exterior Repairs for Stonehaven. Georgetown Housing Authority (GHA) has the need to modernize 60 buildings, Office/Community Building, Management/Maintenance Buildings, Gazebos & Fences with exterior wood trim repairs. Demolition and reworking the rough cedar entries, removing all deteriorated wood on fascia boards, trim, soffits, wood siding, wood fencing and paint exterior surfaces. The city would apply for funds for these repairs to support the preservation of low income rental units.
- 2) Home rehabilitation funds. The 2030 Plan Update Housing Element policy H.1 is to "*Preserve existing housing stock that contributes to affordability.*" Home rehabilitation for low income homeowners supports the preservation of that housing. If awarded, the City intends to partner with Habitat for Humanity to serve eligible households.

Eligible activities include:

- Acquisition of property
- Housing and housing rehabilitation
- Public facilities and improvements
- Homeownership assistance


